



Fingerplays

Fingerplays have been used in early childhood classrooms for years. Fingerplays offer the learner opportunities to develop oral language skills in a fun and playful manner.

The sing- song chants aid in the retention of vocabulary, developing attention skills, imagination skills, memory and motor skills.

Here are some new spring fingerplays

One fingerplay that provides lots of oral language support is Sticky Bubble Gum

Sticky Bubble Gum -song and actions from Hugh Hanley

Spread your hands and turn them from side to side as you sing the first three lines.

Pretend that your hands are covered with bubblegum.

Come under my umbrella, it's starting to rain (wiggle fingers as hands descend)

With thunder and lightning, and thunder and lightning (clap hands on thunder and spread fingers for lightening).

Come under my umbrella it's starting to rain.

(Why not open a big umbrella and let the children come under while singing the song.)

NOTE: Make some play dough frogs and use to act out the song. This song also works as a flannel board story. You can play "in the pond". Use masking tape to create a log on the floor. The children can jump in and out of the pond.

A baby bounce song to the tune The farmer in the dell

The frog hops in the pond (bounce baby on your knee)
The frog hops in the pond (keep bouncing)
He reaches high to catch a fly (lift baby up)
The frog hops in the pond.
