

Youth and young adults who identify at LGBTQ+ are at risk of homelessness at rates much higher than their peers, and often find themselves being made to leave their homes because of who they are. No one should be homeless because of who they are, or who they love. Affordable housing means that LGBTQ+ youth have access to a safe place to call home.

1 in 6 youth in homelessness in Greater Lowell reports fleeing abuse

According to the Community Teamwork Youth Opportunity Center, many of the youth they see in their program are leaving homes that are unsafe, or even dangerous. Creating affordable housing means creating safe spaces for youth and young adults to grow and thrive.

Senior Homelessness is on the rise.

Between 2007 and 2017, the number of people 62 or older in shelters or transitional housing

grew by 69%.

The number of seniors experiencing homelessness is growing. As housing costs skyrocket, those on fixed incomes suffer the most. If we care about our seniors, we have to talk about housing. Only 1 in 3 seniors who qualify for subsidized housing is able to access it - we have to make affordable housing available to our most vulnerable residents.

We have made progress on housing veterans, but even one homeless vet is too many. Many vets in homelessness may even have a voucher for housing - but a lack of affordable units means they still can't get housed. If we want to support our troops, we have to talk about housing,

An individual in chronic homelessness costs taxpayers around \$40,000 a year - and often much more.

Permanent supportive housing costs about \$15,000 a year.

Leaving people homeless costs us MORE.

We have to talk about housing

Housing is expensive - but not as expensive as homelessness. Communities are already spending money on individuals in homelessness - for shelters, emergency medical care, outreach, clean up, and more. If we're going to talk about homelessness, we have to talk about housing. Housing ends homelessness while reducing overall costs - Saving money, and lives.

Housing is healthcare. On average, people without homes die 30 years sooner than people with housing.

We have to talk about housing.

Chronic illnesses like asthma, diabetes and hypertension become more serious when someone is unhoused. Individuals in homelessness die decades sooner than their housed neighbors, often because of an inability to meet basic needs like healthy meals or a good night's sleep. Housing makes the difference - we have to talk about housing.

Nearly 6 of every 10 people experiencing unsheltered homelessness did so in an urban area.

We have to talk about housing.

Urban areas have the highest cost of living, and as housing costs rise, so does homelessness. Affordable housing not only allows us to house individuals in homelessness, it makes it easier for low income individuals to remain housed. Affordable housing benefits our entire community.

If we're going to talk about homelessness... We have to talk about housing.

No conversation about homelessness should happen without talking about housing. Nearly any issue related to homelessness, from encampments to loitering to panhandling, can be resolved with housing. If your concern is related to homelessness, the answer has to be housing.

One in Five residents of Lowell lives below the poverty line.

One in Two spend more than 30% of their income on rent.

Affordable housing impacts your friends and neighbors.

Being rent burdened is the reality for many in our communities. Paying more than 30% of your income to rent can create an unsustainable situation for many of our neighbors, especially those on a fixed income like seniors and students. The overall sustainability of our neighborhoods depends on affordable housing.
