1 in 5 youth in homelessness in Greater Lowell identify as LGBTQ+.

Or that living without a home feels safer than living in one.

1 in 6 youth in homelessness in Greater Lowell reports fleeing abuse.

Since 2018, the Youth Opportunity Center has served nearly 600 youth and young adults who were experiencing homelessness, or at immediate risk of homelessness.

Investing in affordable housing is investing in our youth – giving them a place to call home means they can go to school, start a career, start a family...

It means they can thrive, not just survive.
